Local Government Overview

Understanding the Basics

Local governments provide necessary public services directly to the residents of Pennsylvania. Local governments provide police and fire protection; collect garbage and recycling and provide for its disposal or reuse; treat and supply water and sewage; pave, plow, and light streets and roads; educate our children; provide services for the elderly and at risk youth; maintain parks and offer recreational programs; and much more. Local government impacts the daily lives of residents, businesses, and visitors.

In Pennsylvania, everyone lives in a school district, a county, and a municipality. School districts educate our children. The county oversees elections, social services, the court system, prisons, and property assessment, to name a few responsibilities. The county coordinates emergency management, including 911 center operation, and plans for land use, solid waste disposal, and stormwater. Additionally, some counties own and maintain bridges or roads and many operate parks.

Municipalities, which include boroughs, cities, home rule municipalities, towns, and townships, are responsible for public infrastructure, including roads and bridges, and sewer and water systems. Municipalities provide public safety services, enforce state environmental protection regulations, and may collect trash and recycling. Municipalities may plan how the community wants to develop in the future through a comprehensive plan and enforce this plan through subdivision and land development and zoning ordinances. Municipalities can improve the attractiveness of their community through property maintenance regulations and provide for the quality of life of their citizens through recreational, educational, and cultural activities.

Many local governments work with other municipalities, the county, or school district to provide better services for their residents or to reduce the cost of these services. This includes purchasing equipment and supplies jointly, road maintenance, enforcement of codes, regional police departments, and recreation programs.

Each municipality has similar responsibilities and authority under their municipal code and general state laws. However, the types and level of services provided vary significantly between municipalities. What services a municipality offers depends on community expectations and needs, as well as the ability to pay for desired services.

Municipalities fund facilities and services primarily through taxes and fees. The real estate or property tax is the primary source of tax revenue for many municipalities. This tax is based on property assessments by the county. Residential, commercial, industrial, and agricultural property owners must pay property taxes while certain non profits are exempt.

Real Estate taxes are assessed by the municipality, county, and school district. In Pennsylvania, the county and municipal taxes are combined on one bill, mailed around February 15 and due around June 15 each year. School taxes are mailed around July 15 and due around November 15. More often than not, the combined tax bill for the municipality and county is much less than that of the school tax. For example, in New Freedom Borough, a property assessed at \$200,000 pays the following:

Electronics Recycling

Which Electronic Devices Must Be Recycled?

In Pennsylvania certain electronics are restricted by law from being disposed of in the trash due to the toxic metals they contain. The Covered Device Recycling Act requires "covered devices" to be recycled.

Where Can York County Residents Recycle Electronics?

The York County Electronics Recycling Program accepts electronics to be recycled for FREE from York County residents only. Please bring help with you to unload heavy electronic items if needed. Items are accepted at two separate locations:

Penn Township Recycling Center located at 1020 Wilson Avenue, Hanover

Fall Leaf Collection

The Borough Public Works Department will conduct curbside leaf waste collection from the last Monday of October to the first Monday of December. To make the most of this service, place your leaf waste along the curb by 7:00AM on Monday morning. It's important to note that if leaf waste is mixed or combined with other debris, it cannot be picked up. For efficiency, please refrain from placing leaf waste in plastic bags or

containers. For updates and any changes to the leaf waste collection schedule, keep an eye on our website and Savvy Citizen.

BASIC RESIDENTIAL GUIDELINES

- Trash and recycling must be curbside by 6:00 AM on scheduled collection day, Friday.
- All waste should fit in the mobile cart provided.
- Bulk items should be scheduled through Penn Waste's customer service department at 717-767-4456. You may also schedule online at www.pennwaste.com and chatting with the chatbot Trina.
- Bulk items that are too heavy to be lifted into a truck by two people will not be accepted.
- No construction debris will be collected curb side. Construction debris is material such as cabinetry, flooring or drywall that cannot be accepted curbside. Please contact Penn Waste for pricing on how to dispose of this material.

PROPER CART PLACEMENT

- Place mobile cart with the lid handle pointing toward your residence.
- Place carts at least three feet apart from each other and mailboxes, fire hydrants, low hanging trees or shrubs, parked cars, or utility poles so trucks can easily access the cart.

Handling & Disposal of Asbestos

Why It's Important to Handle Asbestos Safely

Improper handling of asbestos-containing materials puts workers and the general public at risk. Asbestos exposure causes diseases such as mesothelioma cancer, lung cancer and asbestosis. The risk of developing one of these diseases increases with every exposure to asbestos. Unfortunately, mesothelioma specialists haven't found a cure. Asbestos-related diseases are treatable but incurable. That's why strict regulations exist. These regulations aim to prevent workers and the general public from exposure to asbestos. Large fines and serious penalties are in place for those who violate asbestos laws.

How to Handle and Dispose of Asbestos

The first and most important thing to know about handling and disposing of asbestos is that you should not do it yourself. Asbestos is a deadly carcinogen. Only licensed asbestos abatement professionals should handle it. While you can find information online about do-it-yourself asbestos abatement, don't attempt it. Do not disturb asbestos-containing materials in any way. If you ever come across any asbestos products in your home, it's important to make sure they don't release fibers. To do this, gently spray them with water until a professional can look at them and give advice. These professionals are highly trained and certified to follow all federal and state laws. If you don't hire a professional, you are likely to break one of the many laws that regulate asbestos, and you run the risk of facing a serious fine or penalty.

How to Identify and Protect Your Family from Asbestos

Learning about asbestos products that may be common in homes can help you protect your family from asbestos exposure. This will also help your family members learn to recognize and avoid waste that was improperly dumped that may contain asbestos. There is no way to visually know if a product contains asbestos. The best practice is to learn about the products that are likely to contain asbestos and treat them as if they do, until you have them tested. When people rent or purchase a new home that was constructed before the 1990s, it is likely to contain asbestos products. Even new homes built today may contain asbestos in roofing and flooring materials, cement shingles, millboard and corrugated sheets.










Kitchen and Laundry — Simple practices that save a lot of water: Keep drinking water in the refrigerator instead of letting the

- faucet run until the water is cool • Wash fruits and vegetables in a basin. Use a vegetable brush.
- Do not use water to defrost frozen foods; thaw in the refrigerator overnight.
- Scrape, rather than rinse, dishes before loading into the dishwasher; wash only full loads.
- Add food wastes to your compost pile instead of using the garbage disposal.
- Wash only full loads of laundry or use the appropriate water level or load size selection on the washing machine.

Bathroom — Where over half of all water use inside a house takes

- Do not let the water run while shaving or brushing teeth.
- Take short showers instead of tub baths. Turn off the water while soaping or shampooing.
- If you must use a tub, close the drain before turning on the water and fill the tub only half full. Bathe small children together.

 Never use vour toilet as a waste basket




- Consider purchasing high-efficiency tollets or a commercial dam.
 Install low-flow faucet aerators and showerheads.
- Consider purchasing a high efficiency washing machine which
- can save over 50 percent in laundry water and energy use.
 Repair all leaks. A leaky toilet can waste 200 gallons per day. To detect leaks in the toilet, add food coloring to the tank water. If the colored water appears in the bowl, the toilet is leaking.

Landscape Irrigation — Depending on climate, up to 75 percent of a home's total water use during the growing season is for outdoor purposes (During drought conditions outdoor watering restrictions may be imposed, so some of the following tips will not apply.):

- Detect and repair all leaks in irrigation system.
- Water the lawn or garden during the coolest part of the day (early morning is best). Do not water on windy days.
- Set sprinklers to water the lawn or garden only not the street or sidewalk.
- Use soaker hoses or trickle irrigation systems for trees and shrubs.
- Use mulch around shrubs and garden plants to reduce evaporation from the soil surface and cut down on weed growth.
- Raise your lawn mower cutting height longer grass blades help shade each other, reduce evaporation, and inhibit weed growth.

Other Outdoor Uses:

- Sweep driveways, sidewalks and steps rather than hosing off.
- Wash the car with water from a bucket, or consider using a commercial car wash that recycles water
- Control the flow with an automatic shut-off nozzle for the hose.
- Avoid purchasing water toys requiring a constant stream of water.
- Consider purchasing a new water-saving swimming pool filter.
- Use a pool cover to reduce evaporation.
- Do not install or use ornamental water features unless they recycle the water. Use signs to show the public that water is recycled.



New Freedom Borough's Year-Round Brush Collection

Effective Tree Limb Collection:

Our Brush Collection program accepts tree limbs up to six inches in diameter. You can take advantage of this service on the second and fourth Tuesdays of April, May, June, September, and October.

Easy Process for Residents:

To make the most of the brush collection service, all you need to do is ensure your tree limbs are curbside by 7:00 AM on the designated pickup day.

What We Can and Can't Collect:

Please note that we cannot collect stumps, construction materials, or grass. This service is not intended for complete tree removal or site clearing.

Affordable and Accessible Tree Limb Tags:

To facilitate the brush collection process, each collection requires a tree limb tag. These tags are available at the Borough Office for a nominal fee of \$15.00.

Proper Pool Water Discharge

As the end of the swimming season approaches, the Pennsylvania Department of Environmental Protection (DEP) is committed to promoting the proper closure of swimming pools to safeguard stream health and aquatic ecosystems. Whether you're an individual pool owner, manage a public pool, or are part of a pool maintenance company, these crucial reminders and tips are designed to make a positive impact on our environment.

Safeguarding Aquatic Life: A Responsibility We Share

The discharge of pool water and water containing chemicals like chlorine can pose a significant threat to aquatic life if not handled responsibly. It's imperative that we take appropriate measures to ensure these waters are managed in an environmentally conscious manner. The consequences of mishandling such waters can lead to detrimental fish kills and unsafe conditions for aquatic organisms.

Guidelines for Responsible Pool Closure

When preparing to close your pool this season, remember to prioritize Pennsylvania's natural resources by adhering to these best practices:

- © Coordinate with Local Authorities: Before disposing of pool water, make sure to collaborate with your local municipal authority. Many areas, like New Freedom Borough, require residents to notify the Borough Office before releasing pool water into the sanitary sewer system.
- Avoid Storm Sewer Discharge: Under no circumstances should pool water be drained into a storm sewer, as it will ultimately flow into nearby streams. This can introduce harmful chemicals and disrupt aquatic habitats.
- Prevent Street and Alley Discharge: Never allow pool water to be discharged onto public streets or alleys. This water will eventually find its way into the stormwater conveyance system, potentially effecting the quality of local water bodies.
- Mindful Water Level Lowering: If you need to lower your pool's water level, consider allowing it to drain onto your lawn. This precaution prevents excess runoff from entering storm sewers and minimizes its impact on the environment.
- Water for Responsible Irrigation: In cases where a sanitary sewer system isn't accessible, consider using drained pool water for irrigation purposes. However, ensure that the water doesn't run off your property or enter storm sewers.

Legal Implications: Compliance with Clean Streams Law

It's essential to understand that discharging swimming pool water into the Commonwealth's waters without a permit is a direct violation of the Clean Streams Law. To avoid legal consequences and protect both aquatic ecosystems and your own interests, adhere to responsible water disposal practices. Those found in violation of this law, including property owners and pool maintenance companies, may face prosecution and penalties for their actions.

As we bid farewell to another swimming season, let's remember that our actions have a significant impact on the environment. By following the guidelines provided by the Pennsylvania DEP, you play a pivotal role in ensuring the well-being of aquatic life and the preservation of our valuable water resources.
